#### **Circuit Pilgrimage:**



As many of you are aware over the last few weeks I have been walking the circuit. Not all in one go I hasten to add but 3 churches at a time; we have begun with fellowship at one church; walked to the next one for lunch & then onto the third for afternoon tea. In this way I have walked around all 18

churches in the circuit and of course in good Methodist tradition had tea, cakes & worship in them all.

At the very beginning someone dubbed my walks as the 'Superintendents Pilgrimage' and in every way it has beensuch a journey of discovery for all the following reasons:



1. I have never walked alone; I have always had companions on the way and as we have walked we have shared stories; the stories of people's lives; their faith; their triumphs and their tragedies. To share a

journey with someone is a real privilege and one that is part of our calling in Christ to walk alongside people physically, emotionally & spiritually. So thank you for all who have come some of 'the way' with me.

warm welcome & generous hospitality at every church. It once again highlights this gift of hospitality that is a feature of our faith and a tool in our mission. 3. I have discovered so much about the area that is

served by the Vale of Aylesbury Methodist Circuit:

I have heard about local industries and walked the rural landscape; I have seen how history has shaped communities but also how new developments are being built for the future. It has been a fascinating journey enhanced by the local knowledge of those who have met me 'on the way'.

4. Finally I have seen so much good work that is going on across the circuit from lunch groups to children's clubs; mums & tots to fellowships of all description. It is heartening to see the witness & service of the Methodist folk in this area. However if we are called to be a pilgrim people; a people who are always being led on by God's spirit then we can never be complacent in our mission.

Hans Kung wrote this: 'a church which pitches its tent without constantly looking out for new horizons, which does not continually strike camp, is being untrue to its calling. We must play down our longing for certainty, accept what is risky, and live by improvisation and experiment' And so the pilgrimage continues in each community that we serve as we find new and creative ways to share stories, offer hospitality and witness to the love of Christ.

Thank you to all who have shared in some way in the 'pilgrimage' and I look forward to the future as we journey on together in the presence of Christ.

#### **Goodbye to Fred Ireland**



At the end of July we say goodbye to Rev Fred Ireland after 23 years in the circuit. Fred has served in various capacities throughout the circuit beginning as minister at AMC & the circuit Superintendent he then moved onto begin and develop the Church at Fairford Leys; for the last 5 years he has served as minister in Thame,

Chinnor, Haddenham & Cuddington. Throughout this time Fred has continued in his role as chaplain at Aylesbury prison something that he has an immense passion for. Over all these years Fred's ministry has touched so many lives and here are just a few examples:

Many years ago when we both had a full head of hair. I met Fred at the manse on King Edward Avenue. There was a mixture of church goers and as in my case, the non-going husband of a Sunday regular. As we sat in his home Fred put forward the idea of forming a group to be known as 'SOS', 'Sometimes On Sundays'. His idea was to encourage meetings which would be held in people's homes where fellowship could lead to faith and build pastoral care amongst them. In this Fred has more than succeeded as over the years enduring friendships have been made and many stewards, worship leaders and fund raisers both current, past and most likely future, are SOS regulars. But the term 'SOS regular' shouldn't be taken to suggest that the SOS is nothing more than a group where the same people attend every event, just as many come only once a year. This is where Fred's vision is fulfilled, all are welcome, all are cared for and each is as important as the other. So sometimes we meet at AMC, sometimes we meet at a home and sometimes a telephone call is all is needed. Over two decades on from the meeting at K.E.A. the AMC branch of SOS is in good health, Fred has introduced similar groups to Fairford Leys and Thame and soon the community in Carterton and surrounding areas will have the chance to 'just pop round' to Fred and Sue's for a chat about an idea he has had.

Over a decade ago and in partnership with the Anglican. Methodist. Catholic and United Reform Church Fred opened Sunday worship in the newly built St. Mary's School. The vision was for the Church on Fairford Leys to be at the heart of the community and Fred led and inspired the Church through this challenging and exciting period including the building of the new Church. Fred ensured that the Church on Fairford Leys was warm, welcoming and inclusive sharing a passion for his faith which is infectious, enthusiastic, meeting people where they are, rather than where he might prefer to find them. He ensured that the Church was more than just a place of worship and place of fellowship, including introducing YNOTT Sunday evening youth group, setting up and supporting the Friday night Fairford Leys Youth Club, bringing together families and friends over numerous occasions to mention just a few. The impressive growth in Church membership, attendance and related activities evidences the virtue of Fred's blend of faith and humanity. The legacy of his time at Fairford Leys continues to be a blessing and inspiration for all'

#### Finally Arthur Sara offers a very personal viewpoint:

I have known Fred for the whole of the time he has been here. He was like a shot in the arm at Aylesbury bringing in young families and with Sue rejuvenating the junior church. He started a set of new house groups and led us well. He moved on to Fairford leys where he laid the foundation and did much of the ground work that enabled it to become what it is today. Wherever he has been he has brought innovation and improvement and we as a circuit owe him a huge debt for all he has done, all he has achieved and all he has helped us to achieve.

Personally Fred said those few words necessary to show me that I had a call to preach and so for the last twenty years the joy, fulfilment, friendship and fellowship that Chris and I have enjoyed as we have travelled round the circuit have been to a great extent down to Fred.

The icing on that cake came when Fred invited me to join him in a service where I christened my first grandson.

So the circuit owes you a huge debt Fred but it is as nothing compared to the debt that my family and I owe you. Thank you from the bottom our hearts and may God continue to bless you and your ministry in the years ahead.

Fred's ministry among us has being extremely diverse – we could fill this magazine with stories – however we also know that he doesn't really want any fuss made of his leaving. Nevertheless Fred, the Vale of Aylesbury Circuit would like to say a huge 'Thank you' for the many & varied ways you have ministered here and we wish you & Sue and the whole family every blessing for the future as you move on to the Witney & Faringdon circuit.

## Good News About The Good News



Since its beginning, the Christian Church has had the challenge of how best to spread the good news of God's love for all. Paul did it with letters, Wesley did it on horseback and preachers did it and still do it from pulpits. But what about the people passing the doors of our churches who cannot hear what is being said? As we are wont to say in Aylesbury.

"How do we put the greatest number of people in the greatest possible danger of finding the love of Jesus Christ?" Like Paul, like Wesley, like preachers, we have to use whatever methods come to hand.

At this juncture I must issue a warning for all those who recognise a twit when they see one, but may not recognise a tweet. If words like technology, digital and website produce panic attacks, uncontrollable yawning and an instant cure for your insomnia or if you live in a part of the circuit where you cannot get a decent signal for love nor money (Hello Whitchurch!), thank you for reading thus far. Please enjoy the rest of the magazine but as what follows includes words and images you may find distressing, please look away now.

For the rest of us, we know that one important way of communicating who we are and what we are about with those outside the church is through our websites. They certainly get more visitors than our churches do. For instance, in the last 12 months, the Aylesbury church website alone has had 20,023 visitors. Granted some of these were from places like Kazakhstan and the Outer Hebrides. But most were probably local to us. Now your typical website visitor, maybe you included, doesn't stay on a site for more than a few seconds if they don't like what they see, can't find what they want or see it hasn't been updated since Noah was a lad.



If you look at our circuit and Aylesbury websites right now, they both have lots of information on them and lots of pictures too. Yet anyone who believes our cheap and cheerful 'click'n build' site that we have used

since 2004 compares well with professionally designed sites are urged to book an immediate appointment with SpecSavers. Both our sites now look dated, amateurish and in urgent need of a makeover. Well this is where the good news kicks in.

Following investigations and consultation with both the circuit and the Aylesbury leadership teams, it has been agreed that we will change website provider. ThenMedia, a company known to both Helen Kirk and Keith Edwards have offered a cost-effective solution which will give us attractive, easy to navigate and maintain websites for both the circuit and our Aylesbury church. It gets better. The father of the owner of the business is a retired Superintendent Methodist Minister who has developed a way of producing the quarterly preachers' plan in a much easier and quicker way than what we do now. Local preachers who would like to see how this works can go to http://dappleshire.chrestos.co.uk, an imaginary circuit site which has a video on the plan-making. And if you, dear reader, would like to see for yourself what an actual circuit site can look like try www.cheshiresouth.org.uk. For an actual Methodist Church site look at www.altonmethodist.org.uk. The cost to us of making this change and improving our web presence is only about an extra £5 a week.

As I type this, we are aiming to have the new Aylesbury website up and running by the 1st of September. The circuit website will not be far behind and should certainly be this side of Christmas. So website wallahs like Roy Collis and I will be kept off the streets for a bit. Alas, we both share a major failing. We are not clairvoyant. So if you have a suggestion or idea to improve either site or spot an error or omission, please do let us know. Further, if you have an interest or skill in this area and would like to help out in this transition period or longer, we will be delighted to hear from you.



I was asked to write an article about the new websites. However, as you can see, this is not really about our websites. It is about our mission - our mission to share our Good News with those thousands near our churches with a key pad.

#### REPORT FROM SPRING SYNOD HELD AT GREAT CASTERTON IN THE STAMFORD AND RUTLAND CIRCUIT

As usual we started with a short act of worship with three of the newer hymns from Singing the Faith and a formal welcome from the circuit with a lovely story that whilst John Wesley never came to Stamford, he did try to reach Grantham but because of the snow he was forced give up and to spend the night in a local hostelry in Great Casterton, the village where synod was meeting.

The morning session was taken up with business when we heard that Ministers were obliged to attend Synod and also Safer Space Training. We

received many reports from the different arms of the Methodist Church from Action for Children through Education, Methodist Women in Britain, Property, World Church Matters and many more. If you are interested, these reports can be obtained from one of the Synod Representatives.

We watched a DVD on Pioneering Pathways which asked us to pray for guidance as we use our practical skills to encourage engagement with the community with different and pioneering activities. After lunch we had a presentation on 'Five Practices of Fruitful Congregations' based on a book by Robert Schnase. The book gave five headings for things we probably already do. These were: Hospitality; Worship; Faith and Development; Mission and Service and Generosity. The book challenged us to make these the best we can do for God by adding a prefix to these headings to give us **Radical** Hospitality; **Passionate** Worship; **Intentional** Faith Development; **Risk-taking** Mission and Service and **Extravagant** Generosity. Group discussions then followed as we tried to

answer:-

What encourages, enthuses or sparks your interest the most? What seems the most challenging?

Is there anything you would like to add?

What could you take away and use right now?

The whole exercise was challenging and I would challenge our local churches to review some of our practices and see how we can change our church life to include the prefixes above in heavy type in what we do.
