## LETTER TO THE CIRCUIT

#### **Rev Helen Kirk**

I recently showed a group of schoolchildren around one of our circuit churches. At the end of the 'tour' the children asked me all the usual questions - pointing at fixtures and fittings they asked what various things were for; pointing at my neck they asked why I wore a 'dog collar' (the name is usually enough to cause fits of giggles at the thought of an adult wearing a canine accessory!) But the best question came from a boy who simply asked 'Why is the church here?' Why indeed! There are reasons that relate to the history of Methodism; others that concern the prominent local families who built that particular chapel but there is a far more fundamental question for all churches. Why are we here? What purpose does the church serve in the villages and towns where our buildings reside?

The church is far more than any building; the church is first and foremost a community; a community of faith who seek in worship to recognise the presence of God in all things and to follow the teachings of Jesus. Therefore we are far more than a social club; we are about hope and love, tolerance and forgiveness, justice, reconciliation and peace. We are a community who celebrates life and birth and new beginnings as we meet together around a table to share food whether it be tea & cake; soup & sandwiches; bread & wine.

But because we have as our model a love that is eternal we are a community that is not afraid to deal with the big issues of life; to talk of pain and fear; death and suffering as we know One whose presence is constant. And in these ways we link the past to the present and offer hope for the future. We are a transformative community that seeks to subvert all that holds and binds human beings bringing release and freedom; a community willing to sacrifice itself for the love of others for that is what Jesus did.

What is the church here for? It is here for you whether you come in need or joy; whether you believe or don't; the church is that community that exists without for anyone who does not yet belong. Is that true for us?

Come as living stones, the thumb print of the mason on each heart.

Come as living stones, the imprint of the maker on each soul.

Come as loving stones, the honing of life's suffering on each mind.

Come to be made into a house, a community of God's purpose, a place of habitation and welcome, a place to come to and a place to go from. (*Kate McIlhagga*)

### **Ministerial changes**

We are pleased to announce that from 1 March Rev Romilly Micklem will be joining the Vale of Aylesbury Circuit as minister of Christchurch Thame, Chinnor, Haddenham & Cuddington.

I am very much looking forward to ministry at Christchurch Thame, Cuddington, Haddenham and Chinnor, and also to working alongside new colleagues in the

Aylesbury Circuit. There are still a couple of months to go before I start, however—and in our more immediate future, Bridget and I look forward with less excitement to the prospect of de-cluttering and packing up our home of 24½ years in preparation for the big move from our house in Hampton. We are not quite sure whether to be grateful that our two sons (early and mid-20's) are currently away from home...

Looking back over times past makes me realise that the autumn of 2015 marks the point where I have spent half my working life – sixteen years – in secular employment, and the other half either training to be a minister or in unpaid and stipendiary ministry in the United Reformed Church.

Back in 1999 I left my senior post at UBS Warburg in the City of London and started ordination training alongside Methodists and Anglicans in the Cambridge Theological Federation.

Having completed training in 2003, I worked as an unpaid assistant in ministry at Kingston URC while I studied part-time for my PhD.

In 2009 I was called to my current pastorate at St Andrew's Walton-on-Thames, where the congregation was very understanding and supportive in allowing their new minister extra study time to complete the doctorate, which I did in 2010. Since then, my focus has been on practical rather than academic ministry—although I do maintain a research interest in the history of traditions which lie behind the United Reformed Church.

The earlier part of my life was also grounded in the URC: I am a son of the manse, as was my father before me; there are ministers on Bridget's side of the family as well. But I trained initially as a modern linguist and went on to work in the professional services sector, ending up leading IT projects and change management programmes in the UK, Europe and North America.

I have been asked to say something about future plans. My first priority is to listen and learn, as I get to know the people and the situations of the congregations—and to understand their hopes, their aspirations and their needs, as we all seek to discern Christ's kingdom purpose for us and witness to his truth and love.

# CHINNOR METHODIST CHURCH NEEDS YOU ADOPT-A-BRICK

fund raising for much needed refurbishments to the building. The idea of a Jigsaw Festival was something a bit different from the usual concerts and coffee mornings. A number of Church members and other Chinnor residents spent hours doing this - one lady completed 23! #### FAIRTRADE FORTNIGHT 2016 29 February - 13 March

The slogan for the fortnight is: Sit down for breakfast, stand up for farmers!

As Martin Luther King famously said, 'before you finish eating breakfast in the morning, you've depended on more than half the world'. Despite our dependence on farmers and workers for the foods, drinks and products that we love, about 795 million people are undernourished globally.

Many are unaware that the people who grow some of our food can't always feed their own families with an effective diet. By using Fairtrade products as part of our breakfast and other meals we can support farmers and workers to put food on the table to help physical and mental development of their families.

# So what Fairtrade products could you consider for breakfast?

-Bananas-Coffee- Dried Fruit- Fresh Fruit - Honey- Juices - Nuts/Oil Seeds/Oil - Quinoa (can be used in or as porridge) - Rice (in a Kedgeree) - Spices- Sugar- Tea.

Some items, such Muesli, are already prepared for you. Also, remember that some UK milk is now sold on the basis the farmer gets a proper price for the product.

# How much might your Fairtrade breakfast benefit the producer?

Whatever the price of the product on the shelf, the FAIRTRADE Mark ensures that the producers have received what is agreed as a fairer price, as well as the Fairtrade premium to invest in the future of their communities. The Fairtrade price applies at the point where the producer organisation sells to the next person in the supply chain (usually an exporter or importer). It is not calculated as a proportion of the final retail price, which is negotiated between the product manufacturer and the retailer. Therefore regardless of what you pay, the producer is assured a fair price plus a premium, the difference is shared by the others involved in the supply and distribution chain.

#### What can you do?

Try to buy and Buy to try FAIRTRADE Products. (Watch out for the FAIRTRADE symbol)

Ask others if they use FAIRTRADE products and if they will give you a portion to try.

In addition to a taste good experience you should also be entitled to have a feel good experience knowing that your breakfast habit is doing more good than just to you.

Dear Colleagues,

As requested I've written a bit that could be included in a church or circuit newsletter... about our Marriage and Relationships conversations.

"This year's Conference asked the Methodist people to come together prayerfully for conversations about whether or not we should re-visit our current understanding of what marriage is. In this district we have organized occasions at which people are invited to gather together to talk about this question and to bring your views and experiences to share.

Why do I care, as Director of Mission, about these Marriage and Relationships conversations?

Firstly because relationships matter hugely: we all have relationships, all our relationships make a difference to us, we all have different relationships (even when they are with the same people) and I believe God cares about how we relate to each other. Secondly because I want us all to feel confident in our care for others, whatever relationships they are in, and I believe we will get more confident as we talk with one another. Our mission is only really effective if we can reflect God's love as clearly as possible, whatever the family context.

So far we have held three of our District Gatherings and the facilitators have been impressed by the honesty of views and the kindly way that people helped each other to express what we feel and believe about the important question of what marriage is today. So the feedback process has begun!

There are materials for you to use with house-groups, or youth groups, or among your own family and friends. Please be in touch if you would like them... or lots of them can be found on the Methodist Church in Britain website. If you'd like to attend such a gathering for conversation the next nearest ones are shown in the advert below

The sessions begin with prayer and a reminder that the current Methodist definition of marriage is that it is 'a life-long union, in body, mind and soul, of one man and one woman'. During the session we will talk about how the Bible is important and how we interpret what it means for today. We will talk about the changing types of family life, nearly all combinations of which are likely to be present within the outreach of your circuit's work. We will discuss, together, about what the opportunities and also the challenges might be if we decided to re-visit the Methodist Church's definition of marriage.

This is what we are being asked to consider prayerfully...

Do we think we should re-visit our definition of marriage in the light of the changes around us, or not? How might this decision impact on our pastoral work and on our missional work?

If you are not able to come to a gathering see if you can talk with somebody who has been able to come along. You might like to organize more conversations locally. All feedback will be welcome.

## The Circuit Preaching Plan

In the October to December Magazine I outlined just how our preachers and some Church Officers could help the Plan Making Team to put the plan together by supplying information on the dates they would be available to preach or the special arrangements that needed to be made for individual churches.

All this information could be passed on-line into a set of Planning tools called Chrestos which I had been installing with the help of Then Media, the firm Peter Green had described in the previous Magazine. My task had been to supply information to them so they could build the Data Base which enables the whole thing to work, then to find out how it all worked to produce the Plan that is now available; to try to discover as many of the pitfalls as possible and to pass that knowledge on to those involved to make it as easy as possible for them to make their various contributions.

All that went on during August and September so that the system was tried and tested ready to go in October.

Despite some initial reservations the co-operation for this first use of Chrestos was very good. The deadline for information input was 1st November and the Plan was virtually completed by the evening of the 5th November. There were some amendments necessary but the Plan was ready for printing by the 10th November.

The Plan may not look different but it has been produced with much less effort saving everyone's time.

All who provided their information on time are warmly thanked; we will do better next time round if everyone co-operates. To that end the next Planning Period will open on 1st January 2016—see next page.
