LETTER TO THE CIRCUIT

It feels like we are living in a time of great change. The political landscape across the world has shifted with the advent of 'Brexit' & Trump; technology is constantly bringing us new possibilities to transform every aspect of our lives (whether we want them transforming or not) and we are relentlessly bombarded by messages from business, the media and commentators offering us the 'truth' - but it is hard to know what to believe when there are so many competing narratives.

Much seems uncertain and we can feel fearful of the future and so we prefer to look back to the 'good old days' when everything seemed so much surer.

As Methodists we are good at looking back. I have heard many people reminisce about their church's wonderful past: memories of Sunday school anniversaries, large congregations and an abundance of willing office holders to do all the 'jobs'.

Yet perhaps if we are fearful of the future we should look back not just to our immediate past but to our heritage; to who we are as Methodists.

It is worth remembering that when John Wesley was preaching in the 18th Century our nation faced immense instability. Revolution was brewing in America & France; the Scots were seeking independence; innovation was rife in industry but many lived in deep poverty. It was into this social upheaval and unrest that John Wesley and his preachers brought a spiritual and social transformation.

The emphasis of the Methodist movement was (and still is) social justice: that the poorest in the community should be offered practical help and the institutions that denigrated humanity should be reformed. Our Methodist DNA carries a passion for inclusivity as Wesley preached that no one is beyond God's love; all can know God's grace and hope.

This meant that leadership was not the exclusive privilege of the few but an opportunity for all and that church could be church even in a field, a home or a pub. It was this movement of social justice and inclusive grace that offered people a sense of hope and stability. I have to admit I am quite proud of our shared history.

As we end one year and begin another we reflect on the events of the previous 12 months and then look forward to what is to come. As Methodists we have another dimension, for every New Year we remake our covenant with God. This very Methodist practice reminds us of who we are – a people who are known, loved and saved by the grace of God. It also challenges us as to who we will be: compassionate, just, generous, transformative followers of Christ seeking to live not for ourselves but for God and for others.

Maybe in a world that seems uncertain, where many of the loudest narratives are divisive and acrimonious our heritage enables us to offer a different story: one of inclusive community, courageous compassion and selfless service all enabled by a loving and faithful God in whom we can trust for all that is past and all that is to come.

Eternal God, in your faithful and enduring love you call us to share in your gracious covenant in Jesus Christ. In obedience we hear and accept your commands; in love we seek to do your perfect will; with joy we offer ourselves anew to you. We are no longer our own but yours.

The Real Santa Claus

(A Christmas after-thought)

Once there was a poor man with three daughters. In those days a young woman's father had to offer prospective husbands something of value—a dowry. The larger the dowry, the better the chance that a young woman would find a good husband. Without a dowry, a woman was unlikely to marry. This poor man's daughters, without dowries, were therefore destined to be sold into slavery. Mysteriously, on three different



occasions, a bag of gold appeared in their home, providing the needed dowries. The bags of gold, tossed through an open window, are said to have landed in stockings or shoes left before the fire to dry. This led to the custom of children hanging stockings or putting out shoes, eagerly awaiting gifts from Saint Nicholas. Sometimes the story is told with gold balls instead of bags of gold. And so St. Nicholas is a gift-giver.



St Nicholas lived most of his life in Lycia in Asia Minor, a Hellenic Greek province within the Roman Empire. The area is located on what is now the southern coast of Turkey. He was born in Patara. As a young man he went on pilgrimage to the Holy Land, where he lived for a time. Returning by sea, he came to Myra (now Demre), fifty kilometers east of Patara, where he was elected Bishop. While serving as Bishop, Nicholas travelled to Constantinople

(now Istanbul) to plead with the emperor on behalf of the people for lower taxes. In AD 325 he gathered with all the other bishops for the first Ecumenical Council in Nicaea.

Golden years of Blessing



91 year-old Desmond Ffoulkes has just retired after 61 years as a Methodist Local Preacher. He led his final service at Wingrave Methodist Church on Sunday, October 9th. Welcoming him, Wingrave Church Steward John Cotton said how wonderful it had been over the years to have his ministry and

thanked both Des and his wife Kath, who sometimes played their church organ. Des said, "I have always felt that local preaching was both a great responsibility and a great privilege. I was planned to preach here on the first Sunday of the newly refurbished church and now for my final service." Peter Green, a visitor from Des's Aylesbury Church in Buckingham Street said that, "As ever, each part of the service was inter-linked, spiced with interesting illustrations and relevant to today's world. His preaching will be greatly missed.

Tales from the Pulpit

Sometimes in a dream I have been standing before a congregation in a panic because I am totally unprepared and am lost for words! My nearest experience in reality was when I cycled to my appointment and found on arrival at the church, that all my



preparation notes had fallen out of my saddlebag en-route: worrying! Luckily that wasn't the end of the story. I was sitting in the vestry trying to make some hasty notes from memory when Kath turned up at the church. She had seen me ride off and seen my notes fall out just down the road. She gathered them up and drove after me to safely deliver all my notes – Phew, what a relief! Another cycling experience was when I had several miles to ride and discovered that, unusually for Cambridgeshire, the last mile was steadily uphill and against a strong headwind. It was also an unusually hot morning and I was wearing the obligatory suit, so when the service started I was hardly cool, calm and collected. More recently my car refused to start one Sunday morning. A panic telephone SOS to the steward brought him from the edge of the circuit to my home and he got me to the church just as the second hymn ended! His colleague had started it most competently and I had hardly been missed! Perhaps less happy was the time I arrived at the chapel to find it locked. The congregation of two arrived five minutes late and did not like my suggestion that we should sit as an informal group, read the set Bible passages and think about them, using my prepared material. They demanded a 'Proper Service'! One of them could play the harmonium, while the other sat at the back and I mounted the pulpit read, sang five hymns, prayed and preached. It felt like 'Playing Church', but hopefully I was mistaken about that! About the same time I was invited to preach at the ecumenical service in the parish Church. It was a bit daunting for a lay preacher to see most of the town's clergy in the large congregation, but was it in essence so different from preaching in the smallest village chapel with a congregation of two?

Some of the old time preachers used to call all the service up to the sermon as 'the preliminaries'. I believe that every part is important, scripture reading, sermon, prayers, music and hymns and, not least, the (usually silent- except for the hymns) contribution of the people. What matters is whether we are brought closer to God and what difference it makes to how we live.

If I have contributed something over the years of preaching, I received more! It has been a privilege to share and lead worship with so many good people.

What is a poor church?

Prominent church leaders and thinkers have issued a call to action for all the UK's churches, echoing Pope Francis' wish to see "a poor church, for the poor". Their reflections and the challenge for the church are collected in a new resource, *A Church of the Poor*? published by the ecumenical charity Church Action on Poverty. It highlights good work being done in many UK churches to respond to the growing problem of UK poverty. But it also shows that much more needs to be done for the Church genuinely to put the poorest and most vulnerable people first. Church Action on Poverty's Director Niall Cooper says: "Pope Francis has said that he wants 'a poor Church, for the poor' – but what does it actually mean to be a Church of and for the poor?

Here in the UK, are our churches doing enough to stand in solidarity with people in poverty? This is a question which Church Action on Poverty has wrestled with for more than 30 years, but one which we will be pursuing with renewed vigour over the coming months. This call to action is only the start. Our 'Church of the Poor' programme will provide further materials and resources that enable churches to discover together what it means to truly be a church of the poor. We look forward to churches across the UK joining us on this journey!"

The resource includes calls to action from leading figures in nearly all the UK's Christian traditions, including Catholic, Anglican, Methodist, Baptist, United Reformed Church, Church of Scotland, Quaker, Pentecostal, evangelical, and Lutheran. There are some very sharp challenges for the UK's churches.

Regular preachers and some church Officers have access to the CHRESTOS Planning tools that allow them to participate in some important aspects of the development of the Preaching Plan each quarter. Not everyone can see the Website but every church has at least one person who is able to keep their church informed.

It does not take much time particularly when you get familiar with the site.

Leaders of Worship and Preachers Meeting on tour

In mid-October ten members of the Local Preacher's Meeting visited three non-Christian places of worship in Milton Keynes, all known to Ken Harris through his Interfaith work. We were excited to explore the history, core beliefs, worship structure and practicalities of other religions in the area.



Our three-car expedition first met at the Jewish Reform Synagogue in Giffard Park, North-Eastern MK at 10:30am. A Reform Synagogue seeks to treasure Jewish tradition whilst believing it can be relevant in today's society, welcoming members in mixed faith relationships and championing gender equality. We were greeted by Zvi Friedman who led us into their multipurpose room, unfortunately a bit chilly

as there was no service that day – heating costs are a concern for all faiths! The worship area is dominated by a beautiful wooden ark, inlaid with a symbolic marquetry tree and a large reading desk. Zvi explained that the synagogue is over thirty years old and they have been in this building since

2002. Their membership is drawn from a wide area covering Bucks, Beds and Northants, some members living as much as thirty miles away. These members may not attend many services but understandably feel the need to belong to a congregation. They have a thriving Cheder or Jewish School, teaching Hebrew and religious knowledge to children. Zvi took us through their Siddur or service book, for a typical service. The text is provided in Hebrew and English and also in phonetic Hebrew which allows non-speakers to participate in the responses. He then opened the ark and displayed a Torah scroll on the reading desk. An impressive document, handwritten in special Hebrew script, that



requires training to decipher and read. A passage is read at each service, with readers continuing where the reading last finished.

We were due at the Ramgarhia Gurdwara (Sikh Temple) in Kiln Farm, West MK at 12pm and, with the prospect of lunch, we moved on rapidly.





We were warmly greeted by Talvinder Basra who immediately invited us into the dining hall for samosas, bhajis and a welcome mug of tea.

Serving food to anybody who requests it is a big part of the community service element of the Sikh religion (seva) with every temple geared up for serving food on a grand scale. After this so-called 'breakfast' we were invited to join the prayers and music being shared to celebrate a 21st birthday.

In a Sikh temple, everybody must cover their hair so although the ladies in our party were prepared with their own scarves the men needed to use the stock provided for guests. After donning the scarves with varying degrees of success (see photo) we removed our shoes and went upstairs to the prayer hall. Following Ken's lead, we gave respect

to the Guru Granth Sahib (their Holy Scripture) which is revered as their eternal living Guru (following the lineage of the ten human Gurus) and then sat, women on the left and men on the right, to listen to the musicians for a few minutes.

We returned downstairs where Talvinder gave us an introduction to the Sikh religion with key historical events and a guide to their traditions and important symbols including the five 'K's for baptised Sikhs where we were joined by Narinder Ubhi. This was followed by, yes you've guessed it, lunch when we joined the birthday guests. All Sikh food is vegetarian and several of our party were keen to get the recipe for the aubergine curry.

Taking our leave from Talvinder we rushed over to the Zainabiya Islamic Centre in Bletchley (on the southern borders of MK) at 2pm to be met by Arif Masters. Removing our shoes, we went into a multipurpose room surrounded by well-equipped .classrooms.



Arif explained that the Moslem community is growing fast in MK with many young professionals moving to the area. some with voung families. Fear of the prevalence of radicalisation of Moslems in the UK drove us to ask Arif about this but he has seen no evidence of this in their circle. Their community is passionate about integration and sees no barriers to living

in harmony. The building is not technically a mosque as the prayer rooms are also used for other functions. Arif took us into the main prayer room which sported a carpet woven with two ornate bands showing where to place the knees and forehead for prayer. As Shia Moslems, they place a thick disk of compressed soil between their forehead and carpet to remind them that they are prostrating themselves on the ground before God. The room also contained an alcove with ornate miniatures of key Islamic shrines from around the globe designed to ensure that the congregation always keep their physical and spiritual origins in mind. They have a thriving Sunday school with six classrooms accommodating around 100 children who learn Arabic and study the Koran. The Koran is written in a special Arab script and requires training to read and understand and, although translations have been made into many languages, proper understanding of the original text is important for Moslems. I think we all gained a new understanding of some of the traditions and key beliefs of these faiths and some insight into the challenges and opportunities they face. Many thanks to Ken for organising the tour and his Interfaith MK colleagues for taking the time to make us welcome at all three venues.

The Roof



The existing roof was installed in 1873, before the invention of waterproof membranes. There were a few holes where slates were missing or broken.



The first job was to remove the existing roof.



The builder installed a layer of felt to make the roof watertight. He also renewed the battens. Finally the slates were replaced with the addition of a few new slates to cover breakages. New ridge tiles were obtained and fitted.

The Floor



The worship area of our church was on split levels. To make it more versatile we wanted it all one level.

Joists were fitted over the existing floor.



Insulation was inserted between the joists to reduce our carbon footprint.



Finally the floor was sanded and treated.

The entrance porch has been completely renewed, with level access throughout the whole building.

The worship area is now much safer with no split levels

and provides a much more flexible, usable space.
