HELP FOR HAROLD

How was he going to cope in the future? I think that was the question in the elderly gentleman's mind, when Margaret and I got into conversation with him, in the hotel lounge on Christmas Day. He had left his wife in their room, recovering from the hearty Christmas dinner and had found us, fellow guests to talk to. He told us his wife had recently been diagnosed with dementia and he was worried about what might lie in store for them.

Margaret was proud of the fact that she had been able to nurse her mother at home, until she had died peacefully earlier in the year. Their relationship had not been good in the past, but during the time that she had been her mother's carer, they had got on well and had lots of laughs together.

But would this gentleman have the courage and strength to look after his wife like that, when her brain became more and more affected by her illness?

I decided to tell him about Harold. Harold and Audrey had lived in the ground floor flat, under my flat, years ago. He had introduced himself by telling me that they were entertainers. They had once sung in a concert in Winchester Cathedral and still sang for the old folk in a club in the town. They had married in their seventies and it had been a second marriage for them both. I would often see them going for their daily walk, hand in hand, and whenever I visited them, Audrey always pressed some little gift upon me - a cake, a chocolate, an orange.

But then, things started to go wrong. She was getting forgetful. They visited the doctor. A social worker came to see them. They were given leaflets about the Alzheimer's Society. Would Harold like a holiday? Should Audrey spend a week in respite care? No, said Harold. He could cope. They loved each other. Then things got worse. One night I heard him calling for help.

"She's gone. Audrey's gone," he yelled. I rushed downstairs to find that she had left the house. The police located her, half an hour later. She had wandered into the nearby industrial estate and been found by the night watchman. She had thought that she was playing there with her grandchildren.

After that, there were evenings, when my neighbour and I heard alarmingly raised voices. Poor Harold was understandably losing his patience. We feared for their safety. The turning point came, when he fell and broke his hip. When he was admitted to hospital, Audrey had to go into a care home and after he recovered, he was able to have 'Meals on Wheels' and go to a Day Centre twice a week. On other days he visited his wife. Once he no longer had to look after her full time, he began to enjoy her company again. At Christmas he was able to join her for a few days in the Home. I went to see them there. She was not able to carry on a conversation by then, but they sat together holding hands.

I had tried to show that gentleman, in the hotel, that it might be possible for their love for each other to remain, even as her illness progressed, but that he must not be afraid to ask for help, if the time came when he felt he could no longer cope with the demands made upon him.

The next day he introduced me to his wife and I believe Harold's story may have helped him in a small way.



This year, we can have a fresh start, we can ask Jesus to forgive us of our sins and live in our hearts.



Our awesome world again.


We need to stop taking,

We are a Muslim, please



We enjoyed this book, and found the letter to the 7/7 Bomber Shehzad Tanweer in the final chapter to be moving and a testament to the author's ability in the end to be both British and a good Muslim. The letter is profoundly sad and sets out to explain that when he "did what he did" on that day - killing innocent people - he was not being a good Muslim and there will be no reward for him in Heaven.

In the earlier chapters, Malik describes what it was like to be a practising Muslim from birth in Bradford aka Bradistan, Yorks. A feature of her faith was the emphasis on the afterlife and the need to be good in order to go to Heaven.

Heaven and Hell are graphically described by Malik. It was noted that there are some similarities in the experience she describes and our own past experience of Christian worship in Church, for example: the phenomena of the pious nature of the worshippers twinned with their practice of policing the neighbourhood and reporting on anyone who is seen to be out of line. However she also described incidents which contrasted with the Book Club's experience, such as the time she prayed for a flute but none arrived, leading her to conclude that she had not been good enough.

After leaving university, Malik stopped practising for a while but was forced to confront whether she was a Muslim when she was arrested and questioned in Pakistan. Her reflections led her to the conclusion that it was not her but her inquisitors who were not good Muslims.

It was noted that there was little evidence that Malik interacted with children from Christian or secular families. The absence of interaction between established and incoming communities is widespread, and numerous examples were made, such as British expats in Spain or workers in the oil industry. This led to a discussion on the strengths and weaknesses of the policy of multiculturalism.

One of the benefits of reading this book was the opportunity it gave us to learn about the interior world of the author as she was growing up.

About noon on the second day of travel up the river, they began to hear drums. The missionary asked his guide, "What are those drums?"


The guide turned to him and said, "Drums okay, but VERY BAD when they stop."
