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## ABOUT THE PROJECT

## PURPOSE of the Church Welcome Project



"To provide the rapidly growing Aylesbury town centre with an attractive, accessible, meeting place, able to offer a warm welcome, simple refreshment and a listening ear."

# CONTEXT of the Church Welcome Project

26,800 new homes are planned in the Aylesbury Vale between 2013 and 2033.

- Many cuts in local budgets have meant that the opportunity for social interaction becomes ever more difficult for those in need.
- According to the Office for National Statistics (ONS),
  - The number of hours we spend socially interacting in person has fallen dramatically in the last 25 years.
  - The number of people living in one-person households has increased from 17% in 1971 to 29% or 7.7 million people in 2013.
  - In 2013, the number of people who felt lonely some or most of the time were:
    - 29% of those who live alone
    - 45% of those restricted by health or disability and
    - 63% of those who had been widowed.

# VISION of the Church Welcome Project

In the context of the needs of today, it is our vision to create a welcoming space that offers:

- A place of belonging for all, but especially those in the community who struggle to belong.
- An extension of our community centre offering hospitality and engagement with our user groups.
- Internet access enabling people to be included in a digital world and offering support, where needed, to access information.
- An opportunity to share simple refreshment, and when feasible, reasonably priced meals, for those who are on their own or struggling financially, emotionally, physically or mentally.
- A welcoming, friendly, supportive, non-judgemental listening ethos.

### HISTORY of the Church Welcome Project

Concerns about a shabby back door evolved into a £1,000,000 redevelopment of our community centre, reopened in 2009. The motivation was to increase our outreach. We more than doubled this from 41 to over 90 user groups, helped by a part-time volunteer outreach co-ordinator.

Similarly, the need to refurbish the kitchen of our church coffee bar has evolved into this £100,000 scheme to refurbish our church welcome area. We have the same motivation to increase our outreach. We are now ready for a further step change in identifying and meeting new needs within our growing town centre communities. Again, we plan to appoint a part-time volunteer outreach co-ordinator to do this.

The outreach will be greatly helped with a more attractive, welcoming space able to offer a wider range of hot and cold drinks and snacks where people of all ages can meet, eat, relax and feel part of the community.

The existing volunteer-run coffee bar opens six mornings per week, and caters for a small, regular clientele who welcome the friendly company and contact. We want to extend the use of the area and facilities to other special interest groups we identify, especially, but not exclusively, for the lonely and disadvantaged.

## NEEDS of the Church Welcome Project

The present 1980s coffee bar furnishings and fittings are no longer fit for purpose. The need to revamp it was one of the top three priorities listed by the congregation in a 2015 Healthy Churches Review. This involved over 100 completed questionnaires based on seven criteria common to healthy, growing churches. Results were analysed and discussed in follow-up meetings with the minister. An action group was then set up to make recommendations after visiting other successful church coffee bars. In the process, they identified the following:

- The small kitchen has very few appliances and is in desperate need of a complete refit.
- The interior doors do not allow disabled access to the coffee bar.
- The disabled toilet needs to be brought up to the standard of those in our community centre.
- The external glass front was blown inwards several years ago and the temporary fix needs to be made permanent.
- To prevent draughts, there needs to be an effective heat shield between what will become internal and external automatic doors.
- The existing glass screen between the worship area and vestibule is worn, looks dated and needs replacing.
- The 1980s ceiling and its lighting will be damaged with the door and screen changes. An attractive, modern alternative is needed.
- The flooring will also be damaged with the changed doors and screen and will need replacing.



## **DESIGN** of the Church Welcome Project

In this architect's 3D impression please note that:

- 1. The kitchen has been enlarged and has a new display counter
- 2. The new glass screen has doors at either end and can be folded right back.
- 3. The actual lighting in the new ceiling will be decided after receiving tenders
- 4. Rather than buy new chairs and tables, we will be using the existing ones.

## AIMS of the Church Welcome Project

- To refurbish our church entrance and vestibule to match the standards of our community centre.
- 2. To continue to open our volunteer-run coffee bar six mornings per week.
- 3. To offer a variety of Fairtrade coffees, teas, cakes and other snacks at reasonable prices.
- 4. To appoint a volunteer part-time Outreach Co-ordinator to identify local needs, especially of the lonely and disadvantaged.
- 5. To initiate, partner, enable and encourage activities that meet these needs.
- 6. To encourage the afternoon and evening use of the space by these special interest groups.
- 7. To recruit, train and promote the service of Listeners, to help people who need a sympathetic ear.

### MANAGEMENT of the Church Welcome Project

All our church's previous major projects have been completed on time, within budget and paid for in less time than planned. They include the 1980s church refurbishment, the 1990s church roof replacement and the 2000s community centre refurbishment. The latter was part-funded by a Big Lottery Fund grant and all the planned outcomes were met ahead of time.

We intend that this project be similarly well-managed by means of:

- an experienced action group with architectural, technical, financial and projectmanagement skills;
- a rigorous review of component costs;
- a single contact person to liaise with the architect and building contractor;
- a checks-and-balances reporting arrangement with the Church Council (Trustees) and local decision-making body and their delegated executive, the Leadership Team:
- · regular communications with the wider church family;
- following all policies and procedures as set out in Constitutional Practice and Discipline (CPD) of the Methodist Church which can be downloaded from the Methodist Church website, <a href="https://www.methodist.org.uk">www.methodist.org.uk</a>.

### FUNDING of the Church Welcome Project

#### **Funding Strategy**

Our aim is to raise one third of the total cost from our own church members, one third from other Methodist sources and one third from other grant-awarding bodies.

### Our Own Fund-Raising

The plan, as in our past schemes, is to obtain pledges of interest-free loans from our church members. This will be paid back from direct giving and fund-raising over a five-year period. In practice, in all previous projects, we have a track record of repaying such loans well before the agreed time. However, the pledges will enable us to begin work as soon as the other sources of funding are secured.

So suggested options that will be put to our church members are donating a cash sum from savings, making a regular contribution from income, offering an interest-free loan, donating a memorial for a loved one or making a bequest in a will.

#### Other Methodist Funding

We will be seeking financial support from our Circuit, District and Connexional funds. With the project primarily aimed at helping us to further increase our outreach to local communities, we believe that it will meet the key funding criteria of these various funds. The Circuit have already approved a £20,000 grant.

### Other Grant-Awarding Bodies

As with our successful community centre project, we will conduct a search of, and make applications to, grant-awarding bodies, where we seem to meet their criteria.

Our targets are therefore:

# TIMING of the Church Welcome Project

From Church Council approval in October 2017, we aim to have funding commitments in place to start the building work in summer 2018. The building work is estimated to take about three months. During that time, worship services will be held in the church hall. The coffee bar will be able to cater for its existing clientele in the community centre entrance lobby.

### BENEFITS of the Church Welcome Project

- Improved access and facilities for the disabled and parents of young children:
  - o Wheelchair-friendly automatic inner as well as outer doors
  - Upgraded disabled toilet and baby-changing facilities
- Enlarged kitchen able to offer a wider range of refreshments
- A flexible, attractive, meeting space for use by community special interest groups:
  - A convenient walk-in off the street venue, more visible than the community centre rooms
  - An ability to accommodate large events as an overflow
  - The potential to use the church more creatively for, for instance, art exhibitions and school choirs
- Free Wi-Fi and internet connection enabling help for those not able to access the online world
- More suitable doors for the crèche playroom
- Energy-efficient comfort:
  - Heat screen between the automatic doors preventing draughts and retaining heat
  - Energy saving glass screen enabling us to heat only the welcome area when the church is not in use
- In summary, the project offers:
  - improved access:
  - o a more versatile kitchen:
  - o a flexible, attractive, meeting space;
  - o a comfortable, energy-efficient venue;
  - o availability for both church and community use.

#### INTRODUCTION

We are an active, inclusive town centre church; the largest in the Vale of Aylesbury Methodist Circuit and the Northampton District. Our recently refurbished community centre has nine meeting venues used by over 90 church, charity and community groups. They cater for the young, the old, the able and the needy. We have a long tradition of serving God by serving others both locally and in the wider world.
