Many years ago, on a cold, miserable Saturday afternoon in Winter, having run out of ways of entertaining two small boys, we decided to have a film afternoon. ET was on the tv and so with popcorn in hand we sat down as a family to watch. The boys were enchanted by the tale of Elliot & his alien friend until, of course, ET became ill. Joel was about 6 years old at the time and as he watched ET die, tears rolled down his cheeks and he begged us to turn off the tv as he couldn't bear the sadness. As a parent all I

wanted to do was to stop his pain, to take away his grief, but I also knew how the story ended. So, Andrew and I, each holding a tearful child mourning the loss of their fictional friend, waited for the hopeful ending when ET was restored to life and able eventually to go home.

We are at that time of the year again when we watch the unfolding horror of Christ's passion; his suffering, both physical & psychological; his public execution; and there is a part of us that longs to look away, to 'turn off' the awfulness and to move on quickly to Easter Sunday. Even though we know the end of the story, we do not want to linger in the darkness.

And yet part of our faith is to live in that place of struggle; we recognise in Good Friday the pain of the human condition; the hurt, loss and grief that we have experienced or we have seen in others. All we desire is to make it better and yet we know through the story of our faith that you cannot rush hope; Good Friday and Holy Saturday must be lived through before Sunday arrives. But the assurance is that it will arrive; that light will enter dark places and new possibilities will come to barren experience. This is our faith.

I am always interested to reflect on how difficult we, the church, finds the concept of death. I do not mean the personal loss of a loved one but the idea of some aspect of our church life changing or even ceasing. Despite our central story being one of death and resurrection, we seem to view change in the life of the church, not as a part of a natural cycle in which we look forward to something new, but as a failure or a personal affront.

The Methodist Church is asking every church in the country two very simple questions: 'How can we be more fruitful in our worship and witness?' and 'What needs to 'die' for our fruitfulness to grow?'

Over the course of this next year it is a question we will be asking at AMC and all the circuit churches. They are questions that might cause us some pain and some soul searching but they should not be questions we are afraid to answer, for, if we are truly Easter People, we have faith that in God there are always new possibilities; there is always hope.

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



"His daughter will be so upset, if we have lost them," said Jean. "There's only one other place to look. I hardly like to ask you, but do you think you could help me?" I knew what she was suggesting. We put on rubber gloves and set to work on the bag containing kitchen waste. After we had transferred all the mess into the second bag, we had still not found any teeth.

Perhaps Jean had been mistaken. Perhaps he had left his set at home.

The taxi arrived to collect him. Everyone was reaching for their outdoor clothes. It was then that the teeth appeared - from inside the brim of his hat.

January, Arthur Sara

referred to a flipchart covered with numbers.

13, 17, 30, 200+, 2,720, 249,180, 389,651, and finally 638,831.

"Do you know what those numbers refer to? The answer is the Christmas Card shop that we run here each year for the charity Cards for Good Causes.

The **£638,831** is the total value of sales that the shop has made since it was opened by Gordon Bonham **30** years ago; but after **13** years and sales of **£249,180**, Gordon stepped down, and **17** is the number of years that the shop has been managed by Cliff Darlington, with sales in these 17 years being **£389,651**.

The other numbers are my estimates and may give a small indication of the huge amount of work Cliff puts in each year. As these are estimates they may well be inaccurate, but I think that, since each day the shop is open it needs four volunteers to sell the goods, and a manager to be in charge, that is Cliff's 5 a day! But with his contacts and friendly manner he has organised people to fill those **2,720** job slots.

Finally, I think the church has had to be rearranged, and chairs moved, at **least 200** times in Cliff's 17 years. If you add to that all the meetings, the ordering of stock, the pricing and all the other organisation, it has been a huge commitment on his part."

Arthur went on to explain that Cliff is now retiring, and that he was privileged and delighted to make a presentation to Cliff to show our love and

appreciation for all he has done on our behalf throughout those 17 years.

Cliff replied, "It has been my pleasure. I have had a great team and met some wonderful people from the local churches and charities and made some new lifelong friends."

Cliff was pleased to be able to announce that John Miskin has offered to become the new manager when the shop reopens in November.

Ada's Medal

On the occasion of the Queen's Silver Jubilee, the local health authority put forward Ada's name for a Jubilee medal. They knew that everyone in West Norfolk would agree that she deserved it.

When I returned to my home patch, to work in the Queen Elizabeth Maternity Department in King's Lynn General Hospital, all my friends said,



"Oh, then you must know Ada Bayfield." They all loved her. I wonder how many of their babies she had delivered?

Actually, looking back, I realised that I had known her ever since I was a child. She had been Nurse Norman then and my mother and I had often chatted to her, at the post box, in our village. She was working at the Maternity Home in what had been the Vicarage before the War. I think it was partly because I liked her, that I told my school pals, at age six, that I wanted to be a nurse when I grew up.

Ada had trained as a midwife, in London, during the Second World War. She had had to cope with shortages of staff and equipment and dealt with more emergencies than I can possibly imagine. Then as a district midwife, she had pedalled along Norfolk county lanes attending families at their times of need, always with a joke and a smile.

Sister Bayfield was back working in hospital, on night duty, when I encountered her again and by then her name had become a household word. She pretended she did not like little boys and kidded their mothers about them, with her great sense of fun. Her mischievous streak did not always go down well with officialdom though. After the new Maternity Department was built, surrounded by woods, on Holdings Hill, she complained that there were too may flies there, so she wrote a requisition for spiders. The office took a dim view of that. But they did order some fly zappers. She also though the corridors were so long that she really needed her bike to negotiate them.

Ada was very good at making us laugh, but when a handicapped baby was born, she knew exactly the right things to say to the family. She had had a baby daughter when she was newly married, but much later in life she gave birth to Helen, who had Down's syndrome. She was devoted to Helen and did a lot to support the special school, which Helen attended.

When the award of the medal was suggested however, Miss Jennings, the Senior Nursing Officer was rightly rather worried. What would Ada say about it? The day after it had arrived in the post, a reporter from the local paper appeared, to take her photograph, but by then Ada was half way down the by-pass, off to keep her hair appointment. She hadn't got time for that sort of fuss.

Miss Jennings was very afraid Ada would send it back to the Queen, but somehow or other managed to talk her round and organised a lovely party for her, to which all her friends and colleagues were invited.

I, like so many others, am so glad that I knew her.

Seven Seconds (it takes that length of time to make a first impression!!) *'I am the good shepherd.'* John 10: 11

Ever noticed how some people have bad memories of growing up in church? They think back to stern, grumpy faces, delivering harsh messages of condemnation to the world, the sky, and anyone who'd listen.

It's a bit of a disservice to God when you think about it – especially when you remember that Jesus called Himself the 'good shepherd', and that what we translate as 'good' means winsome (attractive, pleasant, engaging).

- If we spent a while thinking, really thinking, about what we'd been given by God, Christians would be the Blackpool illuminations of religious people.
- We'd be constantly, brightly, lit up with joy.
- We'd wear smiles the size of other peoples' mellow frowns.

It tells us something that the usual response these days to the joy of God is 'Oh, of course, but Christians have troubles too.' But they happen against a backdrop of an incredible joy that we might have lost sight of – the type of joy mentioned in Ephesians 5:19, which makes us spontaneously start singing in our hearts and out loud.

We talk about how the joy of God shows up on our faces. If you've realised that you're actually not sure you've ever known that, inside, then today might be the day to check in with God and ask for it.

You can ask Him honestly, because He says He's the good shepherd.

He's totally for you, and He says that the joy He has is actually available to you too – not just as a one-off, or a deposit at the start of your Christian life, but through it all, and into eternity.



"And why would you do that? We both got 9 questions correct," asked the rejected applicant.


"I have based my decision not on the correct answers, but on the question you missed," said the minister.










Study Finds Connection Between Strong Foyer Coffee And Sound Church Theology!!



US - A recent LifeWay Research Center study found an "undeniable" connection between the strength of a church's foyer coffee and the soundness of its theology, a report by the organization revealed Monday.

"Those churches that had coffee rated as 'weak' or 'very weak' suffered from much more watered-down, biblically feeble sermons than those that had bold coffee available in the foyer," the report read in part. "Churches with strong, full-bodied coffee were found to boast much more solid, well-rounded theology from the pulpit."

According to the report, the strong correlation between the two variables suggests some kind of causation. Further, the study suggested that churches that served tea or hot cocoa in place of fresh coffee suffered from more aberrant theology than even the congregations being given watered-down cups of joe (coffee).

Churches that didn't serve coffee at all were not included in the study, as they were assumed to be either apostate, or entirely non-Christian in the first place, according to LifeWay.
