Dear Friends

I hope to start a meaningful conversation. I want to stress there is no hidden agenda here, rather an attempt to engage the church in reflecting on the communal journey we share. Here are some broad brushstrokes, in the hope that, through discussion and prayerful consideration, some detail may emerge. The aim is for there to be a time for folk to come together and share their wisdom as we strive to discern the forward path to which our God is calling

Firstly, to think on 'what is a Minister for?'

About 20 years ago, the Connexion produced a DVD to encourage folk to answer this question. In that time ministry has changed, legislation has had an impact, new ways of working have emerged, and in many places resources are more stretched. So, what should be the churches' core expectations, and importantly, why should that be? Even since Helen left the position has changed, so that all ministers are now involved in a process of supervision, which will take time. So, what is a Minister for?

Secondly, 'what does it mean to be a church family?'

If you read Acts 2:42-47 you will find the earliest picture of the primitive church; it has become a template for the church throughout the ages. The New Testament is full of advice about building community, how we should relate to each other, and there is huge stress on the need to be 'one'.

So, there is the question 'how well do we know each other?' Are we 'one' or a series of congregations? Do the saints above relate to the saints below? Do those who sit on the right have much to do with those on the left? These may seem simple questions but they have great importance. How well do we know each other and what can we do to enhance our awareness of the others who share our pilgrimage? Or in more simple terms, where do we eat together and have fun together? How do we grow in love and understanding? How, together, do we keep an eye out for the absent or the distressed?

Thirdly, 'what it is to be a diverse community?'

I am not sure how many countries are represented in our community, but we have to ask ourselves how well we reflect our diversity. Those who have not been at AMC all their lives bring a rich history to us., The experience of church in other places needs to inform the way we worship and share together. We need a mechanism by which voices can be heard and opportunities considered, in the hope of building up who we are and so celebrating the richness that is part of us. So, what could we learn from other congregations' ways of being church? How do we seek to make AMC a place where our diversity is seen in who we are?

And then, given the chance, what else might you say to the church?

The easiest thing would be for this to become an excuse for a full-blooded whinge about the insignificant, a diatribe about the wrong hymn tune or the welcome stewards' taste in shirts. What ideas do you have? What questions would you like to ask? There is a real importance in building channels of communication to allow, and here is an important word, positive reflections on issues that have importance for folk within our community. To give some examples: I have been asked why I am not at AMC each week, why do the choir sing an introit, through to questions about our response to the homeless and why certain people have certain roles? Where is our place to share, to ask of ourselves in the hope of refining who we are for the better?

So, a conversation, a chance to look closely at who we are and why we do things the way we do? All designed to help us evolve, to find something of the dynamism of the Divine.

In my diary I have set aside the evening of Monday 2nd December to allow a conversation. I will be at church, happy to listen and talk to whoever else wants to come. It would be really helpful, if people had particular thoughts, questions or ideas, to have some advance notice so a pattern can be worked out for the night. The gathering will give opportunity to think, to listen, to share, to build.

I may sit on my own which could be interesting; hopefully though, we can begin a conversation that might change us all for the advancement of the Gospel.



£10 - To feed a child for a whole month.

This simple gift will supply basic food rations to a child living through disaster, keeping them healthy and nourished while their community recovers.

£20 - Goats make great gifts. They provide nourishment for a family and extra income when they are bred and sold. Debby's family received five goats from World Vision in 2013, one male and four females. The Words

Oh dear, what had I said? I could see the tears welling up in Lauren's eyes.

"I'm sorry", I said "I didn't mean to upset you."

"No, it's alright," she gulped. "Please go on with what you are saying."

It was the last night of the holiday, and I was sharing a table in the hotel dining room with this young woman and her parents. I had got to know her Dad on the journey as we had had seats next to each other on the coach.

"Lauren is not saying much," he had said, as his wife handed us sweets, from her place in front of us. "She is in a mood because her boyfriend has dumped her."

"I've gone off tall men," she had declared during dinner on the first night. Although, she had only known this man for a few months, she said she had really thought he was *the one*. She had been introduced to his sister and had met his parents for the first time on the previous Sunday. They had arranged to meet on the Friday evening, when she expected him to arrive home from his work in London. She had booked a table for a meal and they had planned a visit to the cinema. Then he had texted to say that he was delayed. Later he had contacted her again, with apologies. When he did eventually show up, he had given her back her three CDs and said did not want their relationship to continue.

"It's the third time it's happened to her," her father told me, the next morning. "We don't know what keeps going wrong." My heart went out to her. She was thirty and all her friends were getting married. They kept sending her sympathetic messages on her phone, but nothing was helping her.

I asked what work she did. She said she was working in a call centre, answering queries addressed to the Council, but she was not qualified to deal with the problems presented to her. She was simply employed to hand the enquirers on to other people. In spite of this, her job was stressful, because the callers often wanted to pour out all their troubles before she could get a word in edgeways. There was no prospect of promotion for her there, even though she had a Masters degree in English. She was stuck. It seemed very sad to me that her talents were being wasted. I watched her playing with her food, over the next day or two and longed to see her smile.

I remembered how I had once felt, when I came to know that I was in the wrong profession. I also remembered friends who had initially made the wrong career choices but had gone on to find their true forte eventually. I felt strongly that I must help her. I prayed, "Please God give me the right words."

It would have been easy to say nothing. After all, I was on holiday. Her problems were nothing to do with me. Would it be right to barge in and offer advice? I could be told politely to mind my own business. Yet I had this strong urge to speak. If that was the right thing to do, I believed an opportunity to say something would arise and if I failed to take it, I knew I should regret it.

When I was digging into my strawberry meringue, on that last evening, the chance did come. I told her about a personality test, I had once done and how it had helped me. That was when her eyes brimmed with tears. She was interested. I told her that although I had taken a weekend course to learn about it, it is now available on the internet. I had guessed that she, like me, might belong to one of the rarer types and I could see that see she was paying rapt attention. I told her how I also found writing very therapeutic and how I had completed a correspondence course on writing. At the end of it, I had sold sufficient samples of my work to recoup the initial outlay. She confided that she had already considered doing a creative writing course. It occurred to me that, with her degree in English, this might be an excellent thing for her to do. She would not even need to change her job to gain some form of fulfilment.

The next morning, she turned to me on the coach and showed me the result of the personality test I had recommended to her. She had done it on line and I was gratified to find that I had accurately predicted the result, although I had not dared to tell her what I had thought it would be. While waiting for the feeder coach, on the way home, she made a point of coming to thank me and tell me how much I had helped her. There was a broad smile on her face.

I don't know if she will become a best-selling novelist, but God had certainly answered my prayer, for I had been given exactly the right words.





God in Love Unites Us

This is a report published by the church, looking at marriage and relationships, and asking questions about whether we should change our understanding and position.

It stems from the government's decision to change the definition of marriage to allow same sex marriages. The report is Methodism using its processes to respond. We are a democratic movement, so for significant possible changes there is always a consultative process, which normally results in what is termed 'provisional legislation', which is what the recommendations at the end of the report are.

It is really important to note that the proposals are not what Methodism wants to do, rather they are something for opinions to be expressed on. In effect, the working group had to proffer something that could be the basis of what could be voted on at Synod and at Conference. The proposals are not fixed; there is the opportunity to amend them by a process that will be advised in November, and which will inform discussions at Synod and Conference level.

In real terms, the proposals in the report could be very different by the time they get to Conference. So please do not assume that the proposals in the report are going to become the Methodist position.

The report and a study guide are on the Methodist Church of Great Britain website along with a study guide. In Circuit, there will be a day looking at the report at Stoke Mandeville on January 13th, and there will be an AMC discussion as well at some point. Our legal process does not allow a vote, but a conversation which will inform reflection at Circuit Meeting, where our Synod reps will hear something of the mood of the Circuit

One of the key points made is that we are a people of contradictory convictions; the report does not expect unanimity. Some will see the proposals as a breath of fresh air, others will throw their hands up in horror. However, the real need is to hold together as a community of love; there is much about which we may disagree and we live with that tension

The report is worth reading and I would hope folk would, before deciding their response. I have ordered some paper copies but these have not yet arrived.

PLEASE hear the idea that this is something to allow a vote, **not** an indication of intent by the church. It is a response to the fact that the understanding of marriage in law has changed. I am sure amendments will flood in; what will come from this it is difficult to predict. Our real responsibility is to look at this but focus on the key calling of being church - a diverse community bound together by the love of Christ.



Amnesty International's 'Write for Rights' Campaign

1 November – 31 December 2019

It is such a simple thing to write a card with encouraging words or a letter of support or an appeal on behalf of some-one one has never met. It only takes a few minutes, but it can make a big difference to someone.

This is what two people who Amnesty campaigned for last year said:

"I want to thank Amnesty globally. The support they gave us is amazing and it makes a lot of difference. The thousands of letters we have received show that this struggle is not just about us, that we are not alone." **Nonhle Mbuthuma**, land rights defender in South Africa. -

"I am wholeheartedly grateful to all the people around the world who have showered me with compassion and kindness and spared no effort in supporting me." **Athena Daemi,** Iranian <u>civil rights activist</u>, <u>children's rights activist</u>, <u>human rights</u> activist and <u>political prisoner</u> in Iran.

This year we are asked to take action for 10 young people under the age of 25 across the world, who are having their human rights denied.

The information about the campaign and the cases will be displayed shortly (probably with the Charity Christmas cards and in the hall).

Detailed instructions, such as whether we can include our name or whether we can/cannot send a religious card, are given in each case *and it is important that we follow these*.

Helpful suggestions for short solidarity messages are also given. It is important that we do not make any political comments.

The fate of Sarah Mardini and Sean Binder is one of the cases. They are trained rescuers and volunteered for a search-and-rescue organisation in Lesvos, Greece. Their job was to help spot boats in distress at sea and help refugees. But Sarah and Seán ended up behind bars charged with spying, people smuggling and



belonging to a criminal organisation. They spent more than 100 days in prison before being released on bail in December 2018. If found guilty, they could be jailed for 25 years.

Another case is José Adrián from Mexico. In February 2016, aged 14 years, he was walking home from school when he stumbled into the aftermath of a fight between a group of youths in which a police car was damaged. Police officers grabbed him and threw him against the car, and one officer stomped on his neck. José Adrián, who has a hearing disability, was the only one to be arrested. The officers did not provide an explanation or contact his parents.

At the police station, José Adrián was handcuffed, hung from a wall and left for what felt like hours. To get him released, his family, who are Indigenous Maya and live in a disadvantaged community, were forced to pay a fine and the costs of repairing the police car — money they could ill afford. José dropped out of school because of the ordeal.

Today, he is back in high school, and he and his family want to move on with their lives. But the authorities have still not provided reparations or brought the officers responsible to justice. Adrian said: "What I want is that they make [the] police better. I don't want what happened to me to happen to other kids."

You don't have to buy a card. If you have cards from last Christmas with a robin, scenery or flowers, you can cut the side with the greetings off and use the part with the picture to send your greetings.

- 1 cup icing sugar
- 2 tsp. vanilla

Method

Chill dough for 1 hour. Divide into 8 pieces. Roll into 1/2" rolls. Cut in 2" lengths. Taper ends & shape into crescents. Bake for 15 minutes at 300F. [Yield - 4 dozen]

Philippians 2:3 NIV
