WORLD DAY OF PRAYER SERVICE

On Friday 7th March 2025 at 1.30pm At St Mary the Virgin, St Mary's Square, Aylesbury. REFRESHMENTS WILL BE SERVED AFTERWARDS

Our sisters from the Cook Islands have spent the last few years deepening into the theme: "I Made You Wonderful," based on Psalm 139:1-18.

The 2025 programme invites us into the knowledge that each one of us was made with care and love by God. When we can receive this profound truth, everything in our life changes and we begin to radiate and shine from within. We also learn how to treat every other person as made wonderful by God.

The Worship Service invites us to notice aspects of our divinely created bodies that we often take for granted. The scripture reading from Psalms 139:1-18 is woven together with stories of three women from the Cook Islands. We come to understand that God knows us, is always with us, and made us unique and special.

The service leads us to offer prayers of adoration and thanksgiving to our Creator, followed by prayers of confession and longing. Finally, the prayers of intercession guide us to ask God for wisdom, courage and healing, that our world would come to treat all people as "fearfully and wonderfully made."

The Bible Study prompts dialogue around Psalm 139, particularly focusing on the relationship between God and each one of us. The study looks at 3 sections of Psalm 139, each with a different focus: verses 1-6 (God knows us), verses 7-12 (God is with us), and 13-18 (God made us wonderful).

Friendship

'A friend is always loyal, and a brother is born to help in time of need.' Proverbs 17:17 NLT

Jonathan was the rightful heir to the throne of his father, Saul, but David had been called by God to succeed Saul as Israel's next king.

From day one, they were on a collision course. They had everything to lose by becoming friends, because ultimately only one of them could reign.

So how did they handle it? Were they competitive, or suspicious, or jealous of one another? No, because neither was interested in promoting himself. The Bible says, 'Jonathan made a solemn pact with David...by taking off his robe and giving it to David, together with his tunic, sword, bow, and belt' (1 Samuel 18:3-4 NLT). These were his most treasured personal possessions.

He was willing to risk his life for David despite his father Saul's warnings that Jonathan's throne would never be established as long as David was alive (see 1 Samuel 20:31). Likewise, David jeopardised his life fighting the Philistines to help Saul and Jonathan establish their kingdom.

The point of the story is this: a true friend is 'there for you', even when they would rather be somewhere else. As one celebrity said, 'Lots of people want to ride with you in the limo, but what you want is someone who will take the bus with you when the limo breaks down.'

Solomon said, 'A friend is always loyal, and a brother is born to help in time of need.' When was the last time you thanked God for the true friends in your life? What is it that makes them so special?

Don't assume they know how much you appreciate them. Tell them!

And one more thought: if you want to have true friends – become one!

'GOOD NEWS' FROM AROUND THE CIRCUIT

Dear All,

This Sunday, 9 February, the focus of our Circuit Prayers is on Weedon, and we join Sarah as she shares her thoughts on the love that God has



for each one of us. So many people in this world never feel that wonderful touch of God's love in their lives. Please pray for Sarah and the lovely fellowship at Weedon this Sunday, and remember and pray for those who will not feel the warmth of God's love supporting them and walking with them. Pete.

This week our congregation heard a Bible passage from 1 Corinthians 13, that well-known piece written by Paul to the Christian church in Corinth that is often trotted out at weddings, because it speaks of faith, hope and the greatest gift - LOVE. It is a glorious aide-memoire of the qualities that the gift of love bestows - it is kind, thinks no evil, believes all things and, above all, never fails.

Richard reminded us at our service on Sunday, that of course this passage is chosen by newlyweds because it expresses the love that they have in their relationship. But we should think more deeply about the relationships that Paul was originally talking about. What we know is that Paul was encouraging the Church to use their knowledge of Christ and their spiritual gifts to spread the fellowship of Christ, but in love. What he was emphasising in this letter was that other spiritual gifts are meaningless without love. He believed that love is the foundation for living a godly life and that love is a way of life that involves self-sacrifice and service to others.

I am not a romantic by any means, but I am a true believer in love and a believer in true love. And not in any soppy, flaky kind of way. Yes, I love my husband and children, my parents, greater family and friends in an emotional and sentimental way, but my love for God is based on his love for us. His love is unconditional and does not need to be earned, it is not dependent on levels of 'holiness' and it is constant. I do believe that God sees us for what we are,

and understands that our emotions can therefore guide us in our actions and decision-making, but he is love in infinite measure.

His love is so great that he sent us his only Son - and that love, that truth, that constancy gives me the ultimate comfort to live my best life. In our world today, where our cultures and societies bombard us all with endless messages, opinions, views, data and logic, it can be hard not to have information-overload and grow confused about what is actually true.

But what I know, and what this passage reminds me, is that love is a truth-seeker and we should share it with others. This is the love which we wake up with in the morning, we work with, we play with and socialise with. It builds friendships, networks, communities and social groups. It makes me feel whole.
