WORLD DAY OF PRAYER SERVICE

On Friday 7th March 2025 at 1.30pm At St Mary the Virgin, St Mary's Square, Aylesbury. REFRESHMENTS WILL BE SERVED AFTERWARDS

Our sisters from the Cook Islands have spent the last few years deepening into the theme: "I Made You Wonderful," based on Psalm 139:1-18.

The 2025 programme invites us into the knowledge that each one of us was made with care and love by God. When we can receive this profound truth, everything in our life changes and we begin to radiate and shine from within. We also learn how to treat every other person as made wonderful by God.

The Worship Service invites us to notice aspects of our divinely created bodies that we often take for granted. The scripture reading from Psalms 139:1-18 is woven together with stories of three women from the Cook Islands. We come to understand that God knows us, is always with us, and made us unique and special.

The service leads us to offer prayers of adoration and thanksgiving to our Creator, followed by prayers of confession and longing. Finally, the prayers of intercession guide us to ask God for wisdom, courage and healing, that our world would come to treat all people as "fearfully and wonderfully made."

The Bible Study prompts dialogue around Psalm 139, particularly focusing on the relationship between God and each one of us. The study looks at 3 sections of Psalm 139, each with a different focus: verses 1-6 (God knows us), verses 7-12 (God is with us), and 13-18 (God made us wonderful).



Please join us if you can at this service to celebrate the Cook Islands. The World Day of Prayer is an international ecumenical Christian initiative, and all are welcome.

Prayer

'Men always ought to pray and not lose heart.'

Luke 18:1 NKJV

A PhD student at Princeton University once walked into Albert Einstein's office and asked, 'What is there left in the world for original dissertation research?' The brilliant scientist replied, 'Find out about prayer.'

Einstein wasn't the only person who was curious about prayer.

Jesus taught about it, and the reason was because the disciples asked Him to. They may not have desired to write dissertations on it, but they wanted to know how to pray. It's the only time in the Bible where one person clearly teaches another person how to pray, and all because of a request from the disciples.

'Jesus was praying in a certain place. When he finished, one of his disciples said to him, "Lord, teach us to pray" (Luke 11:1 NIV).

The disciples had been observing Jesus as He prayed. Apparently, the way He prayed was so distinct from the way they prayed that they said, 'Show us how to pray the way you pray.'

Before Jesus fed the multitude supernaturally, or selected His twelve disciples, or calmed the storm on the Sea of Galilee, He took time to pray. And the results of His prayers were so amazing that the disciples said, 'Lord, teach us to pray.'

Prayer is not primarily about telling God what you need; it's about getting closer to God. As one pastor writes: 'It's almost as if God is saying, "Don't bring me your shopping list. I already know what's on it. We will deal with that later. Bring me your heart. Bring me your love. Bring me your undivided attention.""

Prayer is not mainly about getting things from the Lord; it's about spending time with the Lord.

During my career as a paediatric oncology outreach nurse, there were many, many, many times I needed more help than the doctors and professionals could give me.

Like the times when the medical teams could only offer palliative and terminal care for a child. Families were left facing the inevitable, being so frightened and scared of the news they had received.

Each family is unique, each child is unique, and their individual needs are unique. Their fear is theirs, and theirs alone.

That family become your most important priority.

Making contact with them and building a relationship based on trust, all needs to be achieved as quickly as possible.

That first meeting and conversation with them will be the key to the door you need constant access to, enabling you to be able to give the care they all need. No pressure!

During that first meeting it would be so easy to get it 'wrong'; your beliefs and opinions need to be way down the list of priorities, and sometimes it is extremely hard to keep from expressing them.

'That family in front of you', their beliefs, their opinions, their fears, their concerns become the priority.

Every time that first meeting was in my diary, I would silently, and sometimes not so silently pray for help, and guidance; I knew I could not do it without God's help.

He gave me strength and confidence to knock the door for the first time. If He was by my side, the right words would be said. He would help me make a horrible experience for them into a less painful one, by helping me to hear what their needs were, so I could hopefully meet them.

A wise and kind man once said to me, "Listening is an art easily taught but not always learnt."

(Listen is an anagram of silent).

Thank you, Lord, for always being there, and listening when I needed you most. Karen




2025 marks Karibuni Children's **30**th Anniversary and we shall be marking this milestone by putting on a number of events throughout the year.
