

WORLD DAY OF PRAYER SERVICE

On Friday 7th March 2025 at 1.30pm At St Mary the Virgin, St Mary's Square, Aylesbury. REFRESHMENTS WILL BE SERVED AFTERWARDS

Our sisters from the Cook Islands have spent the last few years deepening into the theme: "I Made You Wonderful," based on Psalm 139:1-18.

The 2025 programme invites us into the knowledge that each one of us was made with care and love by God. When we can receive this profound truth, everything in our life changes and we begin to radiate and shine from within. We also learn how to treat every other person as made wonderful by God.

The Worship Service invites us to notice aspects of our divinely created bodies that we often take for granted. The scripture reading from Psalms 139:1-18 is woven together with stories of three women from the Cook Islands. We come to understand that God knows us, is always with us, and made us unique and special.

The service leads us to offer prayers of adoration and thanksgiving to our Creator, followed by prayers of confession and longing. Finally, the prayers of intercession guide us to ask God for wisdom, courage and healing, that our world would come to treat all people as "fearfully and wonderfully made."

The Bible Study prompts dialogue around Psalm 139, particularly focusing on the relationship between God and each one of us. The study looks at 3 sections of Psalm 139, each with a different focus: verses 1-6 (God knows us), verses 7-12 (God is with us), and 13-18 (God made us wonderful).

I am always surprised how many people were brought up in Christian households, where reading the Bible, prayers, going to church, and talking about the Bible 'at home', are everyday parts of family life.

And having God as something you would speak of openly at home, I find rather different.

My childhood was wonderful. Saturdays we would have a journey to wherever my Dad's Cricket Team were playing. It could be Ilkley, Follifoot, Skipton or anywhere with a beautiful ground in what we call "God's" Country, yes in a beautiful part of Yorkshire.

Sundays we would usually have a 'run out' in the car to places such as Haworth, Fountains Abbey or Burnsall. We would pack up the car with a fabulous picnic, copious amounts of hot drinks in a flask and some of Mum's home-made cakes to enjoy.

Weekends were family time, time to be together and enjoy every moment. The Church wasn't part of our life.

You may be thinking that I missed out, but I don't see it like that at all. I do remember being dropped off at Sunday School for a few weeks, but I don't think it lasted long and I don't remember wanting to continue going.

I don't believe that people need to be brought up in the faith; God will find a way to plug you in at the right time for you.

So how did I come to be here?

Well, one morning I woke up and I knew I had to go to church.

I was 35, I had a few things going on in my life and I was COMPELLED to go.

I looked at the Church that had a female minister - that service started at 10:30am; the pretty church with the Reverend, started at 10am. So I went to the pretty church, as I thought I would get home earlier too.

I walked in and felt a coldness and greyness envelop me. I waited until people went forward for communion and then I ran. I ran so quickly to leave the church as I knew it wasn't for me.

I drove to the other Church, the one with the female Minister; I was late, and I wondered if I should enter as it was now closer to 11 than 10.

I took a deep breath, put on a big smile and walked into a warm room, where everyone welcomed me with a smile.

The chairs were in a circle and they were playing a game with an arrow that pointed to different questions. And this is where I knew I was called to be.

It was not formal; it was anything but formal, just how I liked things in my life, and I instantly felt at home.

I was called to Two Waters in Apsley, the Methodist Church.

I found God and God found me at the time that was right for me.

God finds people every day.

I'd love to know others who had found God later in life; there are so many of us who God found when the time was right.

Intimacy, dependency, obedience

'The Son can do nothing by himself; he can do only what he sees his Father doing.' John 5:19 NIV

One of the things that define Jesus' relationship with His Father is this: **dependency**.

Corrie ten Boom used to say, 'I am just the glove, Jesus is the hand that fills it and works through it.'

That's a picture of Christ's relationship with His heavenly Father, and it's a blueprint for the kind of relationship you can have with God.

In the Bible you will notice two all-important things about Jesus:

- 1) He never seemed to suffer from the fear of failing, like we so often do. Why? Because He prayed regularly and got direction from His Father. Knowing He was acting on the Father's word and operating in the Father's will, He never doubted. Until you have heard from God, you are a question mark. But once you have heard from God, you are an exclamation mark.
- 2) Jesus knew He couldn't accomplish anything of significance without His Father's direction and power, so He never attempted to.

We, on the other hand, say we trust God but act like everything depends on us. And the result? We fall flat on our faces and keep wondering why.

Every action of God in your life is intended to increase, not decrease, your dependence on Him.

Someone wisely said, 'You'll never know that Christ is all you need until Christ is all you've got.'

To bring you to the place of total dependence on Himself, God will allow your ego to be crushed and your self-sufficiency to be stripped away.


At that point you make a life-changing discovery: when you have nothing left but God – **God is enough!**
