He started the day heading for Stoer. It took, I think, 5 lifts and one bus journey to get him there - many thanks to all concerned, especially the bus driver who handed him £10 to be paid in to CRUK! This will be done on Derek s return. A note is kept of any donations received, and I will total them for the three charities and pay the money in.

While I am on the subject, - a word of advice, I think that Justgiving have put their fees up rather a lot since Derek started in 2022, and the initial sum they add to your donation, is unreasonable, in my opinion.

Back to today's walk. So, from Stoer a beautiful coastal walk of approx 12 miles. Again, beautiful scenery every step of the way. I did not get the name of wherever he walked to, I am afraid, but he had just the one lift to get him back to Inchnadamph.

Derek certainly meets some lovely people on his adventures.

- At last, fresh water en route!








#### Leg 9, day....11?

He's currently staying at the Tongue Hostel, which is reminding him of the Franklin Hotel in Deadwood, South Dakota, bringing back happy memories of a previous expedition a few years back.
