REMEMBRANCE SUNDAY

Next Sunday, on **9**th **November**, it is Remembrance Sunday.



Most of us wear a **Red** poppy - a Symbol of **Remembrance and Hope**, to commemorate the people who sacrificed their lives in the First World War, and conflicts following that war.

You might also like to wear a White poppy for Peace:

- Remembrance of ALL victims of war, including both civilians and members of the armed forces. We remember people of all nationalities.
 We remember those killed in wars happening now, as well as in the past.
 We also remember those who are often excluded from the mainstream, such as refugees and victims of colonial conflicts.
- A Challenge to war & militarism and attempts to glorify or celebrate war.
- A Commitment to peace and to seeking non-violent solutions to conflict.
 By drawing attention to the devastating human cost of war, white poppies highlight the urgency of our ongoing struggle for peace.



Encourage someone today

'Strengthen those who have tired hands...encourage those who have weak knees. Say to those with fearful hearts, "Be strong, and do not fear."'

Every one of us needs encouragement (support that inspires confidence and a will to continue). The words we speak can either build up or tear down the people around us.

Author Rebecca Barlow Jordan writes: 'One of the first questions I like to ask Jesus when I wake up each morning is, "How can I encourage someone today? And who?" He's always faithful to answer, often through His Word.

One morning after asking that question, I read Isaiah 35:3-4 (NLT) and found a practical answer. First, "strengthen those who have tired hands". That might include teachers, hair stylists, mums, writers...missionaries, pastors, and parents...

Next, the passage mentions encouraging those who have "weak knees". I envisioned grandparents and senior citizens, veterans, and even athletes with wear and tear on their bodies.

But the last category, the "fearful", could probably include everyone. These needed to hear the words, "be strong, and do not fear"...

'For me, finding people to encourage is not a problem. Remembering to listen and follow through with Jesus's answers is where I need work. And the amazing thing is, when I try to lift up someone else, I'm the one who ends up encouraged.

Ask Jesus to help you encourage someone today. Invite Him to speak through you, and be prepared for His answers.'

Paul said, 'Be mindful to be a blessing, especially to those of the household of faith' (Gal 6:10). As you fill your mind thinking of ways to strengthen the faith of others, you will be amazed by how much you get energised and blessed in the process.

SWANBOURNE

This Sunday, 2 November, the focus of our Circuit Prayers is on Swanbourne, and Ruth shares her story of how she became a nurse and how her faith enabled her to offer love and care to youngsters and adults in challenging circumstances. We give



thanks and remember in our prayers the lovely people of Swanbourne, and all those whose faith inspires them to offer a ministry to the sick and suffering amongst us. Pete.

I was born in London and was baptised at Methodist Central Hall, Westminster. Having been bombed out during the war, I have no recollection of childhood before the age of six. My first memory was of trying to get out from under the rubble of our home to free my sister, Vera.

We were evacuated to Lacock in Wiltshire to live with my grandmother. I attended Sunday school at the Methodist chapel along with many of the other evacuees. This was a really happy time for me.

After the war we moved to Essex to live with my maternal grandmother who was a very strict lady and life suddenly changed! My sister and I were sent to the Sunday school of the Peculiar People (now the Union of Evangelical Churches) morning and afternoon. In the evening, we had a choice: either to attend the Congregational Chapel with my parents or the Anglican church with my grandmother.

I moved to London to train as a children's nurse where I attended a Methodist church. Unfortunately, I had to leave London through ill-health caused by the smog.

In 1956 I moved to Swanbourne, newly married. I went to the Methodist church in Swanbourne and was made so very welcome as a newcomer to the village; sixty-nine years later I am still a member of the chapel, where a warm welcome is always received.

Throughout my career working with vulnerable children and adults, my faith has helped me deal with some very difficult and challenging times. I hope that, throughout my life, I have been able to make a difference to those I have cared for.
