A CAUTIONARY TALE

showing the Holy Spirit among us at all times.

1963, Skopje, former YUGOLSLAVIA – 80 volunteers, having worked non-stop through the first day and night of the major earthquake that destroyed much of the City, bringing survivors and bodies out of the rubble (almost 1,000 dead in the final counting weeks later), were invited to enjoy a HOT MEAL!

The authorities had found the remains of a kitchen still in working order, and four local chefs volunteered to risk cooking, sitting on the ground floor of a Hotel, tilted more than the Tower of Pisa, with all doors buckled, and entry/exit only through a 2-foot- wide slanted gap in one wall.

Having rapidly and thankfully enjoyed the main course, the dessert was interrupted by a loud crash, rumbling, and the ceiling falling into the meal and onto all within.

The gap was slowly closing. 84 people stood up from the tables, and with smiles and back-patting, calmly climbed over the rapidly increasing rubble and out of the crumbling building. In less than one minute. No shouting, no waving of arms, no panic, as each felt that they were living their last moments of their life. Each knowing that the Holy Spirit was with them.

The recent Fire Drill at AMC matched the timing, so - well done all; each of us must do as they did in Skopje: NO PANIC, NO SHOUTING, NO ARM WAVING! Just walk calmly along to the Exits, so well described by John Miskin – well done John.

How do I know the details so vividly? My Mountaineering Scottish comrade, Doug, and I, were just 2 of the 84 who survived the experience, and who worked so well together over the following weeks.

Write for Rights' Letter Writing Campaign 2025

Welcome to Amnesty's Write for Rights

2025 campaign. The campaign features people from around the world, all of whom are connected because their human rights have been violated. Some by their governments, others by the police, or even by big corporations.

Real letters and cards can bring hope to people in the direct of situations; people who've been harassed, threatened and jailed just for who they are and what they do.

When letters arrive in huge numbers, they are also an unmistakable reminder to prison authorities and others that the world is watching.

For every case, there are two types of messages you can write – one to the person we are fighting for, or their family, so they know we will never forget them, and one to the person in authority.

1. Write a message of solidarity. This is where Write for Rights began: writing a card/letter to people who are wrongly punished, to show them that they're not alone and not forgotten by the rest of the world.

2. Write an appeal letter

In a world of petitions, physical post does get noticed! As well as writing to the people experiencing human rights abuses, you can write to the authorities who can bring them justice.

Rather stay online?

If writing letters isn't for you, you can also take action online – see above.

DOES IT WORK?

Yes! Every year, real change happens because of your letters and actions. People wrongfully imprisoned are released. Abusers are brought to justice. And people in prison are treated more humanely. A few words go a long way, for all of us. They can make us feel seen, supported, safe.

For a few weeks, I shall include two cases, with their details and where to send your card/letter/email.

Your message could make all the difference!

MOTHER NATURE CAMBODIA (MNC) is an award-winning youth-led environmental group known for major campaign victories, including stopping a dam in the Areng Valley and halting destructive sand exports. Its members use peaceful activism to protect forests, rivers and coastal communities.

Since 2016, MNC has faced relentless repression by Cambodian authorities. In July 2024, six activists were sentenced to six to eight years for 'plotting' and 'insulting the King'. These charges are widely seen as punishment for peacefully exposing environmental abuses.

Ratha Sun fled Cambodia to continue their work, but the remaining five young activists remain in prison in poor conditions: Ratha Thun, Kunthea Long, Keoraksmey Phuon, Chandaravuth Ly and Leanghy Yim.

Young activists jailed for protecting the environment

SONIA DAHMANI – Tunisia

Sonia is a lawyer and media personality, has been arbitrarily detained since May 2024 for peacefully exercising her right to freedom of expression. She faces five prosecutions and is enduring cruel, inhumane detention conditions that seriously threaten her health.

Sonia has long spoken out on racism, migration, and prison conditions in Tunisia. Since late 2023, she has faced mounting legal harassment for her public comments. Authorities have charged her under a repressive cybercrime law for 'spreading false news'.

Her arrest follows President Kais Saied's authoritarian power grab and growing repression of civil society. Sonia is one of dozens of people targeted for criticising the government, and her case reflects the sharp decline of free expression and judicial independence in Tunisia.

Urge the president to immediately and unconditionally release Sonia Dahmani,

quash her sentences, and drop all charges against her, as she is detained solely for exercising her right to freedom of expression.

SAI ZAW THAIKE - Thailand

Photojournalist Sai Zaw Thaike was arrested in 2023 after documenting the aftermath of Cyclone Mocha. Sentenced by a military tribunal to 20 years of hard labour, he has been tortured and held in solitary confinement simply for exposing the truth.

Photojournalist imprisoned and tortured for speaking out

Since the 2021 military coup, the junta has cracked down on dissent – revoking media licenses, jailing journalists, and silencing activists. Sai Zaw, who worked for the banned outlet Myanmar Now, risked his life to continue reporting inside the country. He was arrested in Rakhine state, beaten during interrogation and sentenced without legal counsel in a single-day trial. In prison, he has endured torture, including severe beatings and degrading treatment. His case reflects the wider repression of freedom of expression in Myanmar.

'Let all bitterness, wrath, anger...
be put away from you.'

Ephesians 4:31 NKJV

Like Jesus, we have been created in the image of a God who expresses emotions. Neither the Father nor the Son was afraid or embarrassed to feel deeply, and we shouldn't be either.

In Scripture, God's heart broke for His wayward children (see Hosea 11:8-9). Jesus wept openly at the grave of His dear friend Lazarus (see John 11:35). He expressed righteous anger over moneylenders defrauding worshippers in the temple (see Luke 19:45-46). And when it comes to our own feelings, we are neither *powerless pawns* nor *fearful fugitives*.

God wants us to own them, understand their message, and seek His counsel in engaging them for His glory and the benefit of others.

The psalmist often voiced his emotions before God. In Psalm 22:1, he cried out, 'My God...why have you abandoned me? Why are you so far away when I groan for help?' (NLT). Think how he must have felt to make him say those words: intense fear, panic, confusion, disappointment, and betrayal.

But note what he did with his emotions. He took them to God, addressed Him personally, and called on His help: 'Do not stay so far from me, for trouble is near, and no one else can help me' (v. 11 NLT).

David's approach was bold, and he found the help he needed: 'For he has not ignored or belittled the suffering of the needy. He has not turned his back on them, but has listened to their cries for help' (v. 24 NLT).

When you bring your feelings to God, you will find that 'all who seek the Lord will praise him. Their hearts will rejoice with everlasting joy' (v. 26 NLT).
