Write for Rights' Letter Writing Campaign 2025

Welcome to Amnesty's Write for Rights

2025 campaign. The campaign features people from around the world, all of whom are connected because their human rights have been violated. Some by their governments, others by the police, or even by big corporations.

Real letters and cards can bring hope to people in the direct of situations; people who've been harassed, threatened and jailed just for who they are and what they do.

When letters arrive in huge numbers, they are also an unmistakable reminder to prison authorities and others that the world is watching.

For every case, there are two types of messages you can write – one to the person we are fighting for, or their family, so they know we will never forget them, and one to the person in authority.

1. Write a message of solidarity. This is where Write for Rights began: writing a card/letter to people who are wrongly punished, to show them that they're not alone and not forgotten by the rest of the world.

2. Write an appeal letter

In a world of petitions, physical post does get noticed! As well as writing to the people experiencing human rights abuses, you can write to the authorities who can bring them justice.

Rather stay online?

If writing letters isn't for you, you can also take action online – see above.

DOES IT WORK?

Yes! Every year, real change happens because of your letters and actions. People wrongfully imprisoned are released. Abusers are brought to justice. And people in prison are treated more humanely. A few words go a long way, for all of us. They can make us feel seen, supported, safe.

INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS' VISAS REVOKED – USA

Students face detention and deportation for taking part in protests.

Across the USA, international students have faced detention and deportation simply for exercising their right to protest. Many of them had spoken out against the genocide in Gaza and the US government's role in supporting the Israeli authorities' ongoing apartheid and illegal occupation against Palestinians. Earlier this year, US immigration authorities wrongfully arrested and detained at least 10 students for protesting. These incidents are part of a wider, deeply troubling crackdown on student activism, dissent and civic space. It is a pattern we are also seeing echoed on campuses here in the UK. This is a warning to the world: our hard- won rights can be lost overnight. We refuse to remain silent in the face of the Trump administration's human rights abuses. The right to protest, organise and speak out must be defended. All students should feel like they belong on their campus and are free to be themselves without being harassed or singled out.

SEND A MESSAGE OF SUPPORT AND SOLIDARITY:

To your local university or the university you attended.

Suggested message I am writing in solidarity with students in the USA whose rights to express themselves, assemble and associate are under attack. We have seen protests shut down in the US, and similar actions in the UK. We must remind our institutions in both countries that the rights to speak, protest, dissent and demand change and human rights must be upheld. I urge you, as a leader of [name of institution], an institution dedicated to learning, academic freedom and rights - respecting campuses - to recognise your responsibility to speak clearly and publicly in defence of human rights. Defending these rights is essential to the academic mission,

and those who undermine them must be held accountable.

Can I send a religious card or message? No

Include my name and address? Yes, use your full name for the solidarity call; **but for the appeal letter, only use your first name and country**, as there could be a risk of names being recorded and potential visa issues when travelling to the US.

SEND AN APPEAL LETTER: Urge the Secretary of Homeland Security to restore the visas and immigration status of these students and visitors; release all students from immigration detention; refrain from deporting any of them; and end the targeting of students based on their immigration statuses and for exercising their human rights.

CHARACTER IS WHAT COUNTS

'Man looks at the outward appearance, but the LORD looks at the heart.' 1 Samuel 16:7 NKJV

Here is a description of Saul, Israel's first king: 'There was not a more handsome person... among the children of Israel' (1 Samuel 9:2 NKJV). But his looks couldn't compensate for his lack of character, and he died prematurely in shame and defeat. When Samuel the prophet went to the house of Jesse to anoint one of his sons as Israel's next king, God said, 'Man looks at the outward appearance, but the Lord looks at the heart.'

Many years ago, a boy was born in Russia who thought himself to be so ugly, he was certain there would be no happiness for him in life. He bemoaned the fact that he had a wide nose, thick lips, small grey eyes, and big hands and feet. He was so distraught about his appearance that he asked God to work a miracle and turn him into a handsome man. He vowed that if God would do this, he would give Him all he possessed.

That boy was Count Tolstoy, who became one of the world's foremost authors, best known for his epic War and Peace. In his books he admits that, through the years, he discovered that the beauty of physical appearance he had once sought was not the only beauty in life – and it was not the best beauty.

Instead, Tolstoy came to regard the beauty of a strong character as having the greatest good in God's sight.

Character is not a matter of money or looks, but of doing what is right apart from money, and standing up for what's right apart from appearances.
